

## Parametric Climate Risk Microinsurance in the Pacific





### Promoting migrant-friendly towns

Partners involved: ICCCAD, BRAC

- Funding for infrastructures
- Support for institutional capacity building
- Funding and support for migrants
- Test and expand program to other cities/countries

- Just transition for workers affected by SOEs
- Divert migration flows away from big cities + Promote relocation close to home
- Livelihood alternatives
- Building resilient hardware
- Software (legal, policy and institutional frameworks)
- 'Heartware' (awareness, solidarity and support systems)

## Microfinancing as a tool to address L&D for those who stay behind




Partners involved: ICCCAD, BRAC

- Offer more micro-grant options
- Promote the development of social security and social safety nets

- SOEs & livelihood
- Women and family stay behind during resettlement phase
- Depend on microfinancing for income and livelihood
- Currently micro-loans in Bangladesh
- Most recipients are women as they better manage finances and tend to invest into climaterelated expenditure

# Training programmes for community-based mental health and psychosocial support related to natural disasters (2012)

- Fund such programmes
- Promote mental health support in other interventions
- Partner with specialist organisations, inc. WHO

- Community-based mental program
- "Train the trainer" model
- Thailand, Indonesia, China
- Psychological first aid for PTSD situations
- Bolsters social cohesion and collective recovery
- Stigma on mental health and lack of access to professional services

# Salvaging and restoring tangible cultural assets—learning from relocations linked to the mining industry in Senegal

Partners involved: Village of Sabodola (Kedougou), Teranga Gold Corporation, local and national authorities

- Funding similar interventions
- Systematise addressing
   NELD in all interventions
- Prioritise collaborative design of activities

- Sensitive context, with risks of malpractices
- Planned relocation, haltered by disruption of spiritual practices
- 2016 2023: consultations and process of relocation of sacred burial ground
- On-going assessment of impacts on communities, their wellbeing and their practices



## Concluding remarks

- Recent examples must be taken with caution
- Illustrative purpose interact with affected communities to understand their needs
- "Insurance as policy": create compulsion and accessibility for protection to incentivise decarbonisation and resilient behaviours
